'Courage' means the quality of mind or spirit that enables a person to face difficulty, danger, pain, etc. The correct answer is: valour (bravery). Options (1) and (3) are antonyms.

171. Option (1) is correct.

London. The very first statement 'The narrator of this story is a 12-year-old girl who has gone to London with her mother to visit the dentist' affirms 'London' as the correct choice.

172. Option (4) is correct.

The Red Lion. It is stated in the last sentence of the passage that 'The Red Lion' was the name of the pub where the old man went after taking money from the mother and daughter.

173. Option (2) is correct.

The curious old man .A majority of the passage describes the old gentleman, and how he convinces the narrator that his umbrella was a very nice silk umbrella worth twenty pounds, but his legs are weak and he simply must take a taxi home. But when he crosses the road after the exchange, he hardly looked tired as he had complained of, and he enters a pub called "The Red Lion" enters and uses the pound note to pay for a triple whiskey. This explains that the title of the passage should be 'The curious old man'.

174. Option (3) is correct.

The sentence 'Mother gave only the cab fare and did not take the umbrella in return' is incorrect as it is nowhere stated in the passage. The statement 'Old man was selling them a silk umbrella worth one pounds' is incorrect, as he needed an umbrella. The sentence 'The old man used the pound note given by the girl's mother to take the taxi home' is wrong because he enters a pub called "The Red Lion" enters and uses the pound note to pay for a triple whiskey. 'When it's time to go home, they discover that it's pouring rain and they have no umbrella', so the option that when it's time to go home, they discover that it's pouring rain and they have no umbrella is correct.

175. Option (4) is correct.

Ingenuous. 'Distrustful' means suspicious, so the antonym is ingenuous/innocent. 'Cynical' means 'Distrustful'; 'Leery' means Doubtful. All options, except (4) are synonyms of 'distrustful'.

176. Option (1) is correct.

All about earthquakes. The passage includes everything: fault plane, Layers of earth, Mainshock and aftershocks. These all are components of earthquakes. Therefore, the title suitable for the passage is: All about earthquakes.

177. Option (1) is correct.

Core. Boundaries imply edges. Therefore, the antonym is 'core'.

178. Option (1) is correct.

Epicentre. The location below the earth's surface where the earthquake starts is called the hypocentre, and the location directly above it on the surface of the earth is called the Epicentre.

179. Option (2) is correct.

The statement 'The earth has four major layers: the inner core, outer core, mantle and crust' proves (2) as the only incorrect statement. Option (1) is true and reiterated in the second paragraph. The statement 'Depending on the size of the mainshock, aftershocks can continue for weeks, months, and even years after the mainshock!' clearly justifies the genuity of option (3). Option (4) is validated in 'Sometimes an earthquake has foreshocks. These are smaller earthquakes that happen in the same place as the larger earthquake that follows.'

180. Option (2) is correct.

The plate boundaries are made up of many faults. It is clearly stated in the passage that faults make plate boundaries.

181. Option (2) is correct.

The hopping kangaroo is a familiar sight in every snapshot relating to Australia. The phrase 'every snapshot relating to Australia' logically proves that 'familiar' is the right choice, implying people often see this in every snapshot relating to Australia.

182. Option (2) is correct.

The man-sized kangaroos of Australia are capable of speeding up to 88 km/h for short distances. 'Capable' is followed by 'of'. While 'adept' is followed by 'at/in'; 'skilled' is followed by 'at/in'.

183. Option (4) is correct.

Their means of locomotion is their powerful hind legs, which carry them over the ground in jumps of 9 m or more at a time. The meaning of locomotion is an act or the power of moving from place to place, and 'locomotion' is used in reference to animals.

184. Option (4) is correct.

When bothered by predators, kangaroos often head for the water, standing submerged to the chest, and attempting to drown the attacker by holding him underwater. The phrase 'head for' connotes that one is going in that direction, but one is unsure of the route. 'Steer' implies direct, which is a misfit. There is no implication that the kangaroos are returning for the act of drowning the attacker by holding him underwater.

185. Option (1) is correct.

Another defensive technique is to get their back to a tree and kick at their adversary with their clawed hind feet, sometimes with sufficient force to kill a man. The word 'adversary' implies opponent/enemy, and this is the justified choice because the previous sentences draw attention to the attempt of kangaroos to drown the attacker by holding him underwater. The given context refers to another defensive technique, so 'adversary' is the right choice.

186. Option (3) is correct.

When Anoobha entered her bathroom, she found it flooded with water. The verb 'flooded' is used for suggesting the level of water.

187. Option (4) is correct.

Had it been her old house, she would have panicked because her irate landlady would have started calling her names from downstairs by then. The adjective 'irate' (furious) is ascribed to a person, and it has to be the owner of her rented flat. So 'landlady' is the appropriate noun.

188. Option (2) is correct.

But in her new flat, an independent apartment on the third floor, she was saved from having to face anyone's ire whatsoever. 'Apartment' (a room or set of rooms fitted especially with housekeeping facilities

and usually leased as a dwelling.) is the correct choice because it has already been stated that she was in her new flat.

189. Option (3) is correct.

The sight of a flooded bathroom excited her, giving rise to the child in her. 'Excited' is the correct verb for the blank because of the reference to her 'jumping around in the water for a while'.

190. Option (1) is correct.

She jumped around in the water for a while before shutting the tap. The occurrence of a flooded bathroom evinces that the tap was open, so she needed to shut the tap.

191. Option (2) is correct.

We live in an age of wonders and miracles. The indefinite article 'an' sits before words with vowel sounds (age).

192. Option (1) is correct.

It has been called the 'Age of Science', and different aspects of our life that changed in the preceding centuries have been attributed to science. 'Preceding' implies 'previous', so it says that previous centuries have witnessed the change in different aspects of our life.

193. Option (3) is correct.

Thus, the learning that a person gains is incomplete as he or she cannot easily take the advice that another person can give on the basis of knowledge and practical experience that is at his or her disposal. 'Gain' is applied when one obtains or secures something wanted, (here learning).

194. Option (4) is correct.

Today, a small child can access and navigate the Internet with an ease that still astounds those from the older generation. Here, the pronoun 'those' refers to people from the older generation. The word 'these' is used to denote more than one object that is near to the speaker. The word 'those' is used to denote more than one object that is far from the speaker.

195. Option (3) is correct.

Children often miss out on the most enriching childhood experiences such as playing outdoor games with friends, which apart from being immensely enjoyable and physically exhilarating, also develops traits such as teamwork and discipline at an early age. The mention of 'also' mandates the use of a similar phrase meaning 'in addition to', which is best exemplified in 'apart from'.

196. Option (1) is correct.

One month ago, he had lost his vision in a car crash. Given the severity of the car crash, which had sent him into a coma for two weeks, it is most obvious that he must have lost his vision.

197. Option (2) is correct.

With the crash, his promising career as an F1 racer ended. The word 'promising' suits the best, because his career looked hopeful.

198. Option (3) is correct.

All his ambitions tied to the sport were crushed. The word 'crushed' is appropriate because after the car crash, the promising career as an F1 racer ended and his ambitions were crushed (destroyed).

199. Option (2) is correct.

He was one of the youngest racers to have made it to the F1 circuit. A circuit in race refers to a racetrack for automobile races.

200. Option (2) is correct.

His skills were unmatched by any other racer in his country, they say. Since the person was one of the youngest racers to have made it to the F1 circuit, it means that his skills were unmatched by any other racer.
